The Gospel of John 20:15-16


His voice was bright, if a wee bit forced in its cheerfulness. Through my iPhone the question: “How was your Easter?” Perhaps I hesitated for a second longer than I thought and then said: “Quiet, but nonetheless, happy.” For many of us—Most of us?—the Easter of 2021 was not so different from the Easter of 2020. It was quieter than most. I, like you, can hardly wait to be at an Easter where our voices fill the sanctuary with “*Jesus Christ is Risen Today! Alleluia!*” And still, in the quietness of our home, with just the three of us, as a small piece of wheat bread was passed from person to person, it came to me as clear as an Easter morning trumpet blast: There aren’t just three of us here! There are four! He is Risen and with us!

It has been this hope and this sometime once-again-dawning realization that has helped us move through the last 14 months with faith and hope and love. Of course it has not been like we have wanted it to be. Yes, we have missed so many things—quite a few of them precious things—and, yet, in this demanding time in the world, we have seen over and over again that Jesus of Nazareth is risen and not only risen, but with us in this present moment. We see that every time we sit in front of our televisions or iPads or PCs and watch the worship service. We see that when we drop off sandwiches for Cathedral Kitchen or a bag of groceries for the Cherry Hill Food Pantry. We see that when PW circle and Bible studies and Church School and Senior Highs and other small groups gather via Zoom for study and fellowship. We see it when the bells ring in an outdoor service and when the choir again raises their voices and our spirits with their singing. We see that as we chat with one another at coffee hour or gather online to discuss God’s Holy Word. Perhaps all of these things have been a bit like this past Easter, *quieter*, but that doesn’t mean that Christ hasn’t been there.

I imagine that the garden was very quiet that morning as Mary Magdalene came to see if she could discover the body of Jesus. It was his voice that awakened her to his presence and she became aware that it was Jesus, alive and with her. As we move through this Eastertide and on into the summer, the one thing that we know because we have experienced it in our church family is that God has raised Jesus Christ and he continues to call us by name through our life together, our worship and education and mission and fellowship.

In this Eastertide, I am going to try to focus on the voice of Christ speaking in all the many ministries and *many people* that make up the family called Trinity Presbyterian Church. Doing that has helped me during the pandemic; I believe it will continue to help me—and you—as we move into the next chapter. Whatever comes next, of this we can be assured: Jesus is risen and with us. Look around and you will hear him calling your name in the quietness. And also: keep doing the good things because it might be your participation, your kindness, your presence that God uses for someone else to hear the voice of Christ. Believing that that is indeed the case in this quieter Easter gives us all good reason to keep



Next Meeting is Sunday, May 23rd at 1:00 pm



Trinity to Support New Mission—Diapers for Black Philly Moms

Miriam Circle spent last fall studying racism. The Rev. Pat Weikart (Pam Dougherty’s sister) created a Bible/book study for us that explored Ibram X. Kendi’s *How to be an Anti-Racist* as well as Isabel Wilkerson’s *Caste: The Origins of our Discontent*. The long history of racism and suppression that resulted from our nation’s original sin—slavery—was exposed to us, and we were troubled by the role that scripture and churches played in the justification of that institution. But what do we do about it? How can we make a difference today? Rev. Weikart challenged us to find new ways to advance the kingdom of God here on earth, as proclaimed by God in Isaiah 65:17-25.

To that end, we happened upon an article in the *WE THE PEOPLE* section of the Philadelphia Inquirer about SistaTalkPHL, a grassroots project to support Black Philly moms that was founded by Adam McNeil, a Black man who came to the following realization after sitting alone in a hospital lobby in Maryland after being discharged from a serious car accident with no one to come pick him up:

“I just kept saying to myself, ‘you almost died and you have nothing.’ I asked myself who got me through these 30 years. The answer was Black women — my mom, my aunts, my grandmom, and my cousins. If it wasn’t for them, I would have seen Hell a long time ago.”



And so, in that hospital lobby in 2018, 150 miles away from Philadelphia, SistaTalkPHL, McNeil’s grassroots effort to support Black Philly moms, was born.

“In the last six months of 2019 alone, McNeil, 34, of Lansdowne, gave away more than 25,000 diapers, two refrigerators, and two sets of washers and dryers to moms in Philly. Pre-COVID, he also rented out entire laundromats for ‘community wash days,’ inviting moms in to do their laundry for free, while also hosting vendors and nonprofits on-site to provide resources, like the Defender Association of Philadelphia, Forget Me Knot Youth Services, and Bebashi, a health and social services agency. Here’s the thing about SistaTalkPHL: it doesn’t have a fancy executive board or big donors — it’s just got McNeil, his unemployment checks, and donations from people who believe in his work.” As McNeil says: “I don’t have the funds to do it, but I also didn’t have the funds to start it, either. You don’t have to make a million dollars to make a difference.”

Miriam Circle wanted to make a difference, too, so we reached out to the Mission Committee of Session to request that SistaTalkPHL be added to the list of missions that are regularly supported by PW. Eric Waraas and the committee enthusiastically approved and offered to open it up to the entire church as part of our Mission Thursday collections.



In May, we will be asking for donations of diapers (newborn to size 6) pull-ups, and baby wipes. Please bring them to Witherspoon Center on May 13 and 27 from 10am to 12pm. And thank you for helping us take our first steps to advance the kingdom of God here on earth.

After returning to New Jersey, Jim and Georgeanne found their (former) church too focused on politics, and frankly not particularly welcoming. After the start of the pandemic, they decided to look outside the denomination; they tuned into Trinity's online service and found the experience very positive.

Jim and Georgeanne both enjoy travel near and far and movies. Georgeanne likes puzzles, cooking, and volunteering at church. Jim likes reading (especially history) and, in retirement, genealogy. Jim has "O-gauge" trains (a call back to Christmas youth).

In addition to being a “happy stay-at-home Mama to our sweet baby Zoey,” Julie is also an artist—photographer, poet, and an art therapist. She loves nature, abstract painting, the ocean, cats, and creating art with others.

“We feel so blessed to have found Trinity,” Julie says. “I love the name Trinity – In Honor of our one God; the father, son, and the Holy Spirit. I also am happy to join the Presbyterian faith and see women empowered as pastors as well as the democracy of the elders of the church.”
